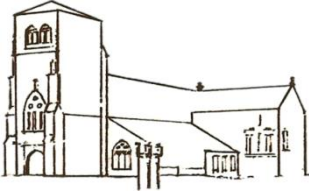

**Revolution in kindness** (as encouraged by Jean Vanier). Thought for this week - *Be the reason someone smiles today*

**Lent** begins this week with **Ash Wednesday**. There will be Mass at 12.00 noon and 7.30 p.m. Ashes will be blessed and distributed after the Gospel in both Masses.

It is a day of **fasting and abstinence** from any meaty products. What this means in practice is that all of us are required to eat very simply and plainly that day. Fish is a luxury. Those with health needs of course take whatever they need.

There is a Fasting tradition in all the world's Faiths and grounded in our own Church practice. Until the War Catholics fasted through the whole of Lent, and in some parts of the Church they still do. e.g. the Christians in Iraq. Wednesday's fast is penitential self denial. A full Lenten fast could mean abstaining from all those inbetween snacks, eating more simply and eating less. We do it to lose weight, how much more for our spiritual wellbeing. The Family Fast Day (next week) is a fast in solidarity with the world's poor and a means of raising money to alleviate at least a little suffering. Good Friday fasting takes on a different perspective. Jesus has been taken away - we are in mourning. Our fast unites us with his death. Really the Good Friday fast should overlap to Holy Saturday and finish with the Easter Vigil.

During Lent we will try and keep before our eyes the importance and significance of what Lent means. For my own part I need Lent as a renewed call to basics. Jesus prayed and fasted for forty days "driven by the Spirit" to work out what his ministry would entail. We need time set aside to be open to God, to listen and be led by the Spirit. We look at the addictions that creep up on us – new ones affecting people are games on the smart phone or the tablet. Many people look for suitable Lenten reading. We could well read the four Gospels as well. Alms giving is always a key element in Lent. If we save money by reducing our pleasures where does the money go to? You may well feel called to take part in the day's retreat on 3<sup>rd</sup> March, which Fr. Richard will be leading. A time to listen and reflect – and to pray. We will be using our new parish rooms.

Devotionally there will be STATIONS OF THE CROSS every Wednesday evening at 7.00 p.m., followed by Mass at 7.30 p.m. If you would like regular periods of prayer before the Blessed Sacrament other than those already in use just let me know.

**Today's Scripture Readings.** Jesus did not come to heal people physically. He came to proclaim the Good News of God's love and to give "his life as a sacrifice for us all." But



he did heal, and we get the clue as to why he healed from today's Gospel. The Leper says – *Lord, if you want to, you can heal me.*

Jesus replies – *Of course I want to, Be healed!*

Our translation of Mark's original Greek is so inadequate. It reads "feeling sorry for him, Jesus..." What it says literally is that *Jesus' bowels turned upside down* at the sight of the man. Jesus felt such deep compassion for him.

In English we use the word - *empathy*- to describe Jesus' reaction. It means he felt the pain of the man himself, such was his sensitivity for suffering people. He healed the man to stop his own pain.

Jesus complained at people wanting to see only *signs and wonders*. People don't come to faith because of miracles. They come to faith by seeing how people live, by the change they see in the lives of others, by the kindness they experience, by sensing in some special way God touching their lives. St. Paul says faith comes *by hearing*. The power of God's word, proclaimed with faith, changes people's lives. If people say they believe because of a wonderful sign they have seen, what happens when that kind of sign ceases? In fact miracles happen all the time, but only people who are sensitive to God recognise what they are.

If Jesus is so moved at the sight of suffering that he feels compelled to heal the victim, it must be the same for his friends, his followers, for us Christians. All the teaching about relationships which Jesus gives us, *to love the enemy, to do good to those who hate us, to pray for those who persecute us*, are not just words of encouragement. We see Jesus living them out himself. We profess our love for him, and it must be of love of him that makes us see people differently. Loving him makes us to want to do those things, to live in that way.

Many people are afraid to accept the consequences of really loving God because it appears very painful and very demanding. It can seem to be quite scary, almost entering the unknown. Do I trust what is happening to me? But it is joy, it is life giving and the only way we can fulfil the real yearnings of our hearts.
