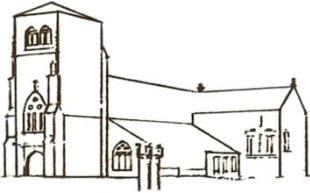

Kind words are like honey – sweet to the soul, healthy for the body. (Proverbs 16:24)

In today's Scripture readings we hear that
"God loved the world so much that he gave his only son so that everyone who believes in him may...have eternal life"

"The Son of Man must be lifted up...so that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him".

So the gift is from God – and we respond to being loved.

These are familiar words from John's Gospel. Maybe not as familiar but equally powerful are these words from Paul to the Ephesians, today's second reading. *"God loved us with so much love that he was generous with his mercy; when we were dead through our sins he brought us to life in Christ"* Then come those key words *"it is through GRACE that we are saved...not by anything of your own"*. With the magnificent climax

"We are God's Word of Art".

Not just other people, not just the saints, not just the missionaries or the Carmelites, but YOU and ME. That is the reason why we are to live the *"good life as from the beginning he had meant us to live it"*.

Why not pray the **Stations of the Cross** in your own home? Make your own reflections quietly, perhaps concluding with the prayers given at each Station.

First Station	Jesus is Condemned to Death O Jesus! So uncomplaining, teach me resignation in trials.
Second Station	Jesus Carries His Cross My Jesus, this Cross should be mine, not yours; my sins crucified you.
Third Station	Jesus Falls the First Time O Jesus! By this first fall, never let me fall into sin.
Fourth Station	Jesus Meets His Mother O Jesus! May no human tie, however dear, keep me from following the road of the Cross.
Fifth Station	Simon the Cyrenean Helps Jesus Carry His Cross Simon unwillingly assisted you; may I suffer all my pain with patience
Sixth Station	Veronica Wipes the Face of Jesus O Jesus! you imprinted your sacred features upon Veronica's veil; stamp them also indelibly upon my heart.
Seventh Station	Jesus falls the second time. By your second fall, preserve me, dear Lord, from relapse into sin.
Eighth Station	Jesus Consoles the Women of Jerusalem My greatest consolation would be to hear you say: "Many sins are forgiven you, because you have loved much."
Ninth Station	The Third Fall of Jesus O Jesus! when I am weary on life's long journey, be my strength and my perseverance.
Tenth Station	Jesus Stripped of His Garments My soul has been robbed of its robe of innocence; clothe me, dear Jesus, with the garb of true repentance
Eleventh Station	Jesus Nailed to the Cross You forgave your enemies; Lord Jesus, teach me to forgive injuries and forget them.
Twelfth Station	Jesus Dies on the Cross You are dying, my Jesus, but your Sacred Heart still throbs with love for us.
Thirteenth Station	Jesus Taken Down from the Cross Receive me into your arms, O Sorrowful Mother; and obtain for me perfect Sorrow for my sins.
Fourteenth Station	Jesus Laid in the sepulchre When I receive you into my heart in Holy Communion, O Jesus, make it a fit abiding place for Thy adorable Body. Amen.

After the evening Mass on Wednesday, 14th.March, we will be having reflections inspired by **Laudato Si** and the Gospel reading for the Fourth Sunday of Lent.

The Eucharistic Congress. The main day of the Congress is the Saturday, September, 8th., when ten thousand people from all over the country will gather in the Echo Arena. We have been asked to provide **five people from our parish** to represent us. The main speaker is Bishop Barron, a Bishop in California, who has a huge online ministry and has provided many courses in the Faith. He will be well worth hearing. Please let me know if you would like to take part. There are also a number of fringe events associated with the Congress. More information to follow.

Care for our common home Pope Francis reminds us that 'everything is interconnected, and that genuine care for our own lives and our relationships with nature is inseparable from fraternity, justice and faithfulness to others' (Laudato Si 70). Is it our wildlife, our green spaces, our oceans, our libraries and playgrounds? What small step can you take this week to try and help this happen? Journey to Faith. This year's programme is drawing to a close as we prepare for the Baptisms at Easter; There are three who joined us after we had started the programme and they will continue after Easter at another time. Please pray for all our new Christians.

Fair Trade Easter Eggs. We will be selling Real Easter Eggs with the Easter message again this year. The price is still £3.99. People were very good last year when it seemed we had badly over ordered. So rather than presume on people's good will we have ordered fewer eggs this year – though still a lot.

We have been informed that there are several places on the **local youth Lourdes bus** for July's pilgrimage. Any of our young people who are fifteen by the end of July are invited to apply. Please see Deacon Francis.

The Parish Rooms. The St. Bernard's Room, which includes the kitchen, is looking lovely, bright, cheerful and welcoming. The cooker has come. The fridge also will be here this coming week. The carpet in the cloister will be down this week. Three extra radiators are being fitted. The new gates are erected. All three toilets, including the accessible toilet, are now in use. We are still awaiting progress on the block floor of the St. Anne's room.
